Science students get a head start on their futures

More than 60 students attended the inaugural session of the University Science Transition Experience Program (USTEP) held last week at Simon Fraser University. Qualified secondary students receive high school credit for attending the specially designed seminars offered by SFU's science faculty. It's a free program for students looking to enrich their education with an introduction to the university environment. The series of interactive sessions on the theme of energy will be led by SFU professors. Students will choose a topic and create a project based on the material discussed in the sessions with mentorship and performance assessments set by the students' teachers.
