

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT
Reporting to Public Session on Tuesday, June 25, 2024

1. Burnaby Youth Sustainability Network and Simon Fraser University Climate Project Challenge

The Burnaby School District in collaboration with Simon Fraser University (SFU) participated in their second annual Climate Project Challenge. The aim of the project is to increase community awareness and engage Burnaby youth in the area of sustainability and climate action. With the help of our Burnaby Youth Sustainability Network (BYSN), information was sent to each school inviting teams of students, kindergarten through grade 12, to submit proposals challenging their schools and communities to improve sustainability. Grants were awarded to several schools to help further their projects. On May 29, a celebratory event was held at Burnaby Central Secondary School, featuring presentations from five of the winning groups. Students presented their ideas, along with their project status, and hopes for the coming year.

This evening, students from Moscrop Secondary School will be sharing their Climate Project Challenge ideas. Eliza Brenman, the District's Manager of Energy and Sustainability will outline the project and share the results of the Climate Project Challenge.

2. Youth Work in Trades Award

Career Education and Youth Work in Trades

Career Education in Burnaby is thriving. This year, students enrolled in the course Work Experience 12A have gone out on over 1000 community-based placements where they have the opportunity to work alongside and learn from those currently working in our local businesses. Our Career Education Advisors work to solidify and expand relationships with local industries and businesses. We see the impact these experiences have on students in a number of ways, but perhaps the most telling is the roughly 275 students accepted into industry training programs as of this week. We are up significantly in many of our industry training programs and expect to have over 300 students enrolled next year.

Of note, we have seen growth in a number of our Youth Train in Trades programs, such as Auto Service Technician, Baker, Electrician, Carpenter, Hairdresser, Metal Fabricator, Plumber, Cook Training, and Welder.

Another highlight for this year is our partnership with Burnaby Community & Continuing Education on the Early Childhood Education Assistant program, which was offered for the first time. We currently have 12 ECEA students registered for next year, with applications still being received.

Youth Work in Trades Award

The Youth Work in Trades Program provides skill development through practical hands-on work

experience. Students in grades 10-12 enrolled in the program have the opportunity to work as trades apprentices while attending secondary school at the same time. Students are formally registered with Skill Trades BC as youth apprentices while earning credits towards their graduation program.

Registered youth apprentices who meet required criteria, including graduating with a grade 12 Dogwood Diploma or Adult Dogwood, successfully completing the Youth Work in Trades course work, maintaining a prescribed grade point average and reporting a minimum of 900 hours of work to Skill Trades BC are eligible for the Youth Work in Trades Award. The \$1000 award is intended to help apprentices to continue in the trades and pay for their next level of technical training, purchase tools and equipment.

The Burnaby School District has 9 recipients of this award this year. In addition, 42 students are currently registered as apprentices with Skill Trades BC and are now busy accumulating work-based hours for this year's awards.

With 103 students completing Youth Train in Trades programs this school year, we can expect Burnaby's number of registered apprentices to continue to grow. Nick Christofides, Director of Instruction, and Allison McKillop, District Program Consultant, Career Education and Transition Programs will acknowledge the successes of the program and the impressive achievements of these students.

Recommendation:

THAT the Board of Education receive this information.

3. Accessibility in Burnaby Schools

The *Accessible British Columbia Act* provides organizations, including school districts, a framework to identify, remove, and prevent barriers to accessibility. The Provincial Government created the legislation as an important step to making British Columbia a more accessible province for all.

Last December, after consultation and input from people with lived experience with disabilities and accessibility, the District launched a comprehensive multi-year Accessibility Plan as part of our work toward making the District's learning and working environments inclusive and accessible places for all. The plan is available on the District website. The District website also allows users to share feedback on the Accessibility Plan and report any barriers they encounter.

During AccessAbility Week, a number of learning activities for students put a spotlight on accessibility and inclusion for all. The Burnaby School District also shared learning opportunities for staff in advance of National AccessAbility Week.

Kathryn Yamamoto and Janice Nakatsu, Directors of Instruction, will provide highlights of the District's work around the Accessibility Plan and its impact in schools.

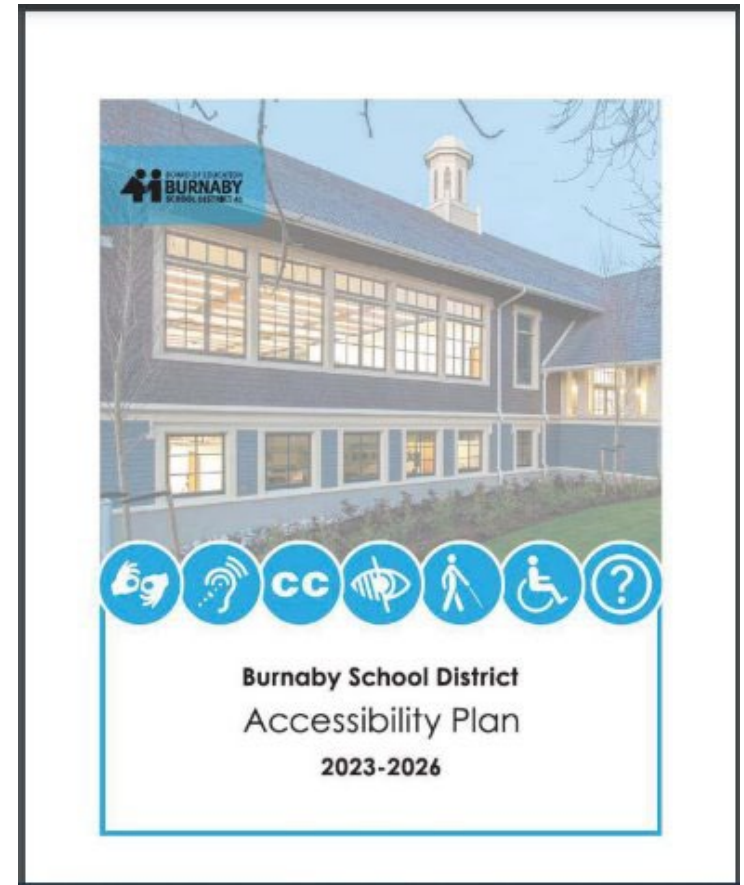

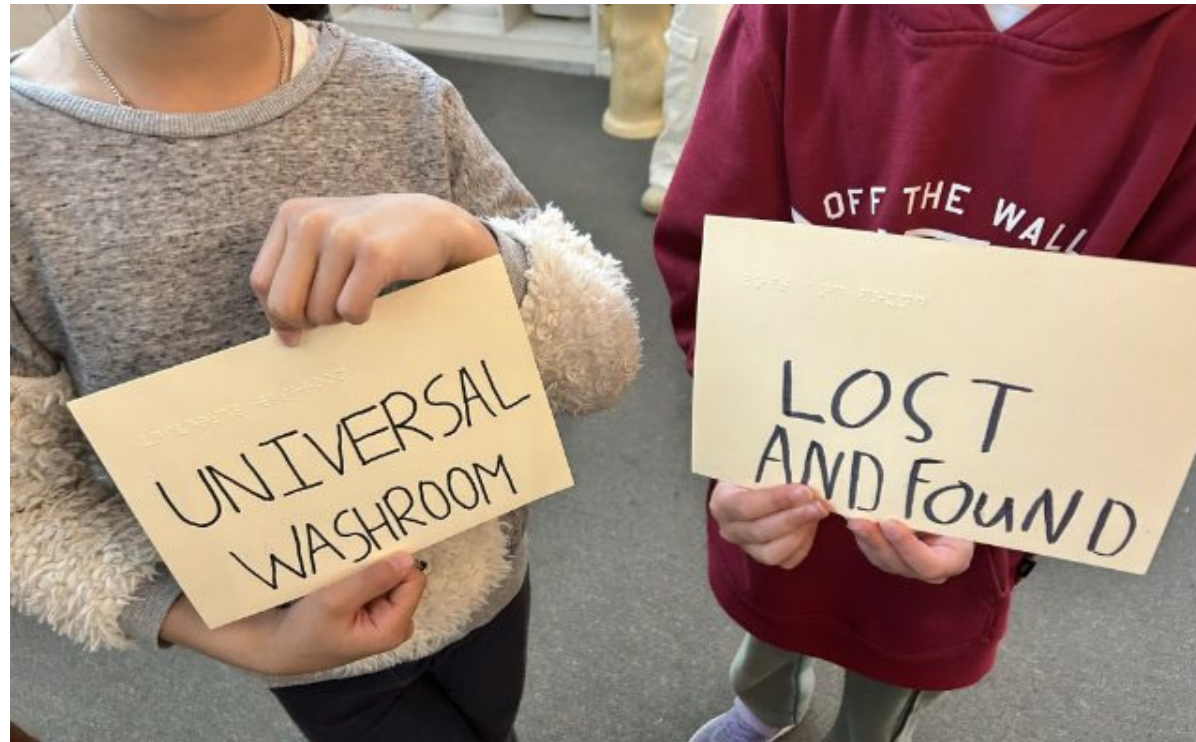
