AN ENGAGING AND ACTIVE SUMMER

Burnaby Schools remained busy places over July and August. Last year's record-breaking numbers for **Summer Session** were surpassed – with nearly 10,000 courses taken. Children and youth enjoyed classes in everything from Rock Band to technology-focused courses, such as robotics. Partnerships helped boost the fun, as seen here at **Edmonds Community School** where the **Burnaby Fire Department** provided a joyous way to cool down in the sun. The District's **Settlement Workers in Schools** program held a summer camp for newcomers to Canada. More than 30 students – originally from Afghan, Eritrean, Kurdish and Ukrainian communities – took part. A wide range of activities and excursions were offered. In August, students, families and District leaders proudly walked in the **Vancouver Pride Parade** – all in celebration of the diversity that strengthens our schools and workplaces. Accomplishments by students continued over the summer. Alpha Secondary's Stephanie Chu earned a Society for **Canadian Women in Science and Technology Award** for her science project on infrared radiative cooling. A stunning photo by **Max Thom** from **Moscrop Secondary** won a contest put on by the **American Association of Physics Teachers**. The photo earned third place in its category.

GOODBYE SUMMER, HELLO SCHOOL

In the final days of summer break, leadership students at Burnaby North Secondary gathered to plan events and help peers get settled. The new year began with special welcomes, such as these at Kitchener and Capitol Hill Elementary. The Grade 8s at Byrne Creek Community School gathered for connection time and high school tips, such as opening your locker. Orientations were held across the District to greet and support students who are part of the International Education program. The Indigenous Education Team grounded the start of the year with teachings and ceremony led by Squamish Nation Elders Delhia and Latash Nahanee. More students are taking Career Education programs. Their significant increase in popularity, year-over-year, was featured in the news. The first day of school for children at Confederation Park Elementary was also highlighted in local media. Children at Twelfth Avenue Elementary focused on the power of words. At Chaffey-Burke Elementary, students did community-building activities. University Highlands Elementary had a fun back to school display with childhood photos of school staff. Connection was also built through fun at Suncrest Elementary where students wrapped up the first week with a popsicle and book with a buddy. Many schools, such as Cariboo Hill Secondary and Burnaby North, held welcome back barbeques. Brantford Elementary's included shaved ice and a dance party. Cameron Elementary hosted a community event with more than a thousand people. The North Burnaby Community Fair – put on with partners – included games, special welcomes, live music, and food.

MOVING FORWARD WITH LARGER SCHOOLS

Following an announcement by the **Ministry of Education and Child Care** over the summer, exciting news awaited returning students and staff at **Cameron** and **Kitchener Elementary** schools. With a 67.6-million-dollar investment, the Ministry approved a new school building for **Cameron** that will add 425 new student spaces. **Kitchener** will be getting an even larger expansion than previously announced last December, with an updated total of 500 new student seats. This month, the Ministry approved a combined 16-million dollars for prefabricated additions at **Alpha Secondary** and **Nelson Elementary**. All of the schools are in neighbourhoods that have been growing rapidly. **Nelson** will get a four-classroom prefabricated addition – adding 100 new seats for children. While **Alpha** has been approved for a 12-classroom prefabricated addition, with space for 300 more students.

A CANADIAN ICON'S LEGACY LIVES ON WITH LEARNING AND GIVING

Students throughout the District – including these at Confederation Park Elementary – participated in their school's Terry Fox Run, walk, or roll. Children and youth, such as these at Kitchener Elementary, came together to discuss Terry's legacy as a positive agent of change. Collectively school communities raise tens of thousands of dollars for cancer research. With the fun incentive of getting to soak staff with water, students at Twelfth Avenue Elementary raised more than one-thousand dollars. At the high school level, Alpha Secondary's goal is to raise five-thousand dollars to support the fight against brain cancer.

EMBRACING THE ENVIRONMENT WHILE MAKING CONNECTIONS

Across the District, students continue to develop an appreciation of what nature has to offer through a variety of ways. These Grade 6/7 students at **Brantford Elementary** delighted in beachcombing during their field trip that included a four-kilometre hike. A class of Kindergarten children at **Marlborough Elementary** enjoyed fresh salsa with tomatoes from the garden. And thanks to the **Garden Committee** at **Gilmore Community School**, children were welcomed to school with blooms.

THE STARTING LINEUP FOR FALL SPORTS

Elementary cross-country meets have begun with students coming together from across the District. At the high school level, fall sports such as soccer and field hockey are underway – as seen here at Byrne Creek, Moscrop, Burnaby North, and Burnaby Central Secondary schools. Volleyball competition is on, including at Burnaby South Secondary where the Grade 9 girls won their home opener. The Junior Girls Volleyball Team at Burnaby Central Secondary began the year with three big wins. The Senior Boys Volleyball Team at Burnaby North took the top spot over the weekend at the Thunderbird Classic Tournament held at UBC. Adding to the excitement, last year's wrestling team from Cariboo Hill Secondary, who won Provincials, received their rings this month. Byrne Creek's basketball team also took a look back – celebrating alumni, including one who went on to play post-secondary and another who is playing pro in Germany.
