REFLECTIONS AND HEARTFELT TRIBUTES TO CANADA'S VETERANS

Remembrance Day and National Indigenous Veterans Day were recognized across the District this month. This display is one of the ways **University Highlands Elementary** honoured the stories of Indigenous veterans. In a decade's old tradition at a housing centre that opened for veterans at the end of World War II, students from Cariboo Hill Secondary planted small flags in remembrance. Students led and performed at high school assemblies, such as at Alpha, Byrne Creek, Burnaby Mountain, and Cariboo Hill. Some examples of elementary assemblies can be seen here at Gilpin, Brantford, and Marlborough. Remembrance Day is also a time when many classes reflect through art, such as these creations by children at South Slope, Twelfth Avenue and Kitchener. Grade 3s and 4s at Buckingham Elementary wrote about what peace means to them. Student-created wreaths were a visual centre piece at many elementary ceremonies, such as these at Rosser and Nelson. A sharing of cultural knowledge and the honouring of Indigenous veterans took place at a special gathering at Nelson. A Grade 4/5 class at Brentwood Park Elementary learned about the contributions of Code Talkers, who developed a coded system based on the Cree language to disguise military intelligence. Also at Brentwood, a Grade 5/6 class shared their learning about Indigenous veterans at the school's assembly. Kindergarten students at **Brentwood** had a visit and lesson about peace and poppies from leadership students at nearby Alpha Secondary. As part of the Remembrance Day ceremony at Seaforth Elementary, school staff talked about the impact of war through sharing their personal stories and reflections with students. FRESH LEARNING IN THE GREAT OUTDOORS

Students across the District are learning about sustainability, exploring outdoors and building connection with the environment. Children of all ages planted Indigenous trees at Nelson **Elementary**. They worked as a community with help from the District's maintenance crew. The plantings were part of their school-wide efforts to connect with the land and honour Truth and Reconciliation. Kindergarten students at **University Highlands** have been enjoying "Forest Fridays." A Grade 4/5 class at **University Highlands** "upcycled" newspapers and plastic bags to create water-resistant mats for their gardening sessions. Children at **Kitchener** led a **Stream of Dreams** project. The painted wooden fish on their school fence help raise awareness about protecting waterways and the wildlife that depend upon them. As part of the project, a group of students also participated in a community clean-up. The **Green Team** at **Cariboo Hill** gathered to harvest their potatoes and plant garlic. And a Grade 9 class at **Byrne Creek** hosted a fair exploring climate change, sustainable design, and other ways to help the environment.

ILLUMINATING CONNECTION THROUGH CULTURE AND COMMUNITY

Across the District, school communities come together in many ways – such as this Diwali celebration at Alpha Secondary. A club at Cariboo Hill Secondary planned Diwali-themed games and a photo booth. The **Parent Advisory Council** or PAC at **Brantford Elementary** organized a school wide **Rangoli** activity as part of Diwali celebrations. PACs were also instrumental in making movie nights happen for elementary students and their families at University Highlands, Kitchener, Stoney Creek and Taylor Park. The PAC at Byrne Creek Community School provided support for the library's first UNO tournament, which 40 students competed in. Also in the library, students in Japanese classes at Byrne Creek shared culture and food with peers. In the Burnaby Public Library, a group of women who are newcomers and refugees from Afghanistan have been taking English classes. The weekend program was featured in the Burnaby Now. Created by the District's Settlement Workers in Schools or SWIS Program, it's taught by a volunteer instructor. In connection with the Vancouver Writer's Festival, a Deaf author visited elementary students at the BC Provincial School for the Deaf. Students from Twelfth Avenue Elementary did a field trip to watch the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra. They performed "The Spirit Horse Returns," which includes perspectives from an Indigenous Knowledge Keeper. And Grade 1 students from Brentwood Park did some intergenerational sharing and art with their "Grand Buddies" at a nearby seniors' residence.

LESSONS THROUGH SPORT: INSPIRING GROWTH AND TEAMWORK

Canadian Olympic gold medalist Christa Deguchi visited University Highlands Elementary. In addition to speaking with the children, the judo champion showed the school some expert moves. Two Grade 4/5 classes from Twelfth Avenue did a field trip to the Grey Cup Festival. They had the chance to enjoy immersive football experiences, ziplines and more as part of the festivities preceding the 111th Grey Cup. An indoor World Cup-themed soccer intramural drew children at Edmonds Community School. Elementary volleyball, such as seen here at Kitchener, has been culminating in tournaments for many schools. Several – such as this playday at Burnaby Central and this one at Alpha – are hosted by high schools. As the fall sports season ends, many high schools have been earning banners, including Burnaby North. The Grade 8 girls volleyball team are league champions. As are the Junior Boys soccer team. The Senior Girls field hockey team at **North** earned their banner in a shootout with **Burnaby** Mountain. The Provincials for aquatics had several students representing Burnaby Schools, including those from Burnaby North, Moscrop and Burnaby Mountain. The mixed open relay team from Burnaby Mountain brought home the hardware, placing first. Cross-country runners - including this Alpha athlete - competed in zone championships. Two female athletes at Burnaby South gualified for the cross-country provincials. South's Grade 9 girls team came from behind to win the volleyball banner. The Junior Girls volleyball teams from Burnaby North and Burnaby Central represented the District well at Provincials. Byrne Creek's Senior Boys soccer team made school history, winning the Fraser North Championship for the first time. And in the Triple-A field, Burnaby North garnered media attention and made it all the way to a tight provincial final. In a 1-0 game, they earned 2nd in all of BC.
